## to the Jon Peterson Special Needs Scholarship Program

IDEA and Chapter 3323	Peterson Scholarship Program
A public school district must provide a <b>Free</b>	A child who participates in the Jon Peterson Scholarship
<b>Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)</b> to students with disabilities. A <b>Free Appropriate Public</b>	Program is a unilaterally privately placed student, and is <b>not entitled to FAPE</b> .
<b>Education</b> includes special education and related	
services that:	
<ul> <li>Are provided at no cost;</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Meet the standards of the Ohio Department</li> </ul>	
of Education and Workforce;	
<ul> <li>Include an appropriate preschool,</li> </ul>	
elementary, or secondary school education; and	
<ul> <li>Are provided in conformity with an IEP that meets Ohio's standards for IEPs.</li> </ul>	
Special education is specially designed instruction to meet the needs of a child with a disability.	
Examples of related services include transportation, speech-language pathology services, audiology	
services, interpreting services, physical and	
occupational therapy, recreation, and counseling services.	
A FAPE must be provided at no cost to the parents.	A participating student receives a scholarship of up to
	\$30,000 to pay for a special education program at a
	registered private provider or alternative public provider. If
	the program costs more than the scholarship, the parents
	are responsible.
