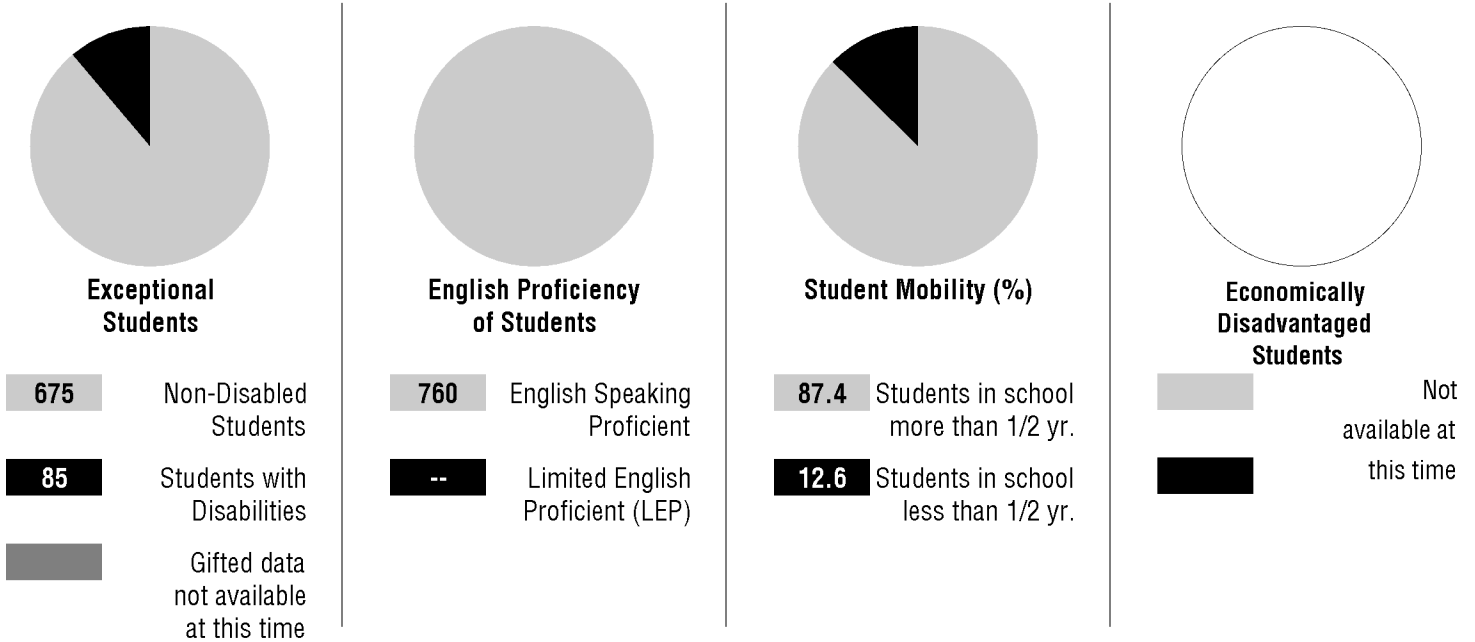

Safety and Resources

Your School's Safety and Discipline Record

School safety is a concern for every parent. The State of Ohio requires that a district collect information on the safety record of its schools. Detailed district suspension and expulsion information is available from your district office or can be accessed through the internet at www.ode.state.oh.us.

Although expulsion and suspension numbers provide an important piece of information about school safety, they cannot provide a complete picture of all of the variables that make a school safe and drug-free. After you review the district discipline information, you might want to discuss the following questions with school personnel:

- How does your child's school create a caring and supportive learning environment that fosters positive relationships between students and school personnel?
- What types of positive classroom and building discipline approaches are implemented to both promote desired behavior and address problems as early as possible?
- What are the various disciplinary approaches, such as an in-school suspension class, utilized by your school in working with specific student behaviors?
- Does your child's school have a comprehensive school safety plan in place that addresses a variety of crises that could occur such as a weather related emergency or an intruder in the building?
- Has your school or district formed a community task force or coalition with strong parent representation that promotes positive youth development and addresses safety issues specific to your school and community?
- Has your school implemented a student assistance program that addresses learning, emotional and behavioral problems that impact learning?
- How does your school and district make use of resources provided through the Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act grant that is available to each district in Ohio?
- Does your school use both internal and external support personnel such as counselors and social workers to provide assistance to students?

Your Child's Test Results

Information You Need to Know as a Parent

The Ohio General Assembly passed new legislation in spring 2001 calling for:

- New testing programs for Ohio students, and
- New accountability standards for school buildings, in addition to existing accountability standards for school districts.

These two initiatives will be phased-in over the next eight years. Ohio's Local Report Cards were redesigned to provide detailed information on a school, its students and their performance on

Ohio's Proficiency Tests. **Students are tested so parents and teachers can understand where a student has strengths and weaknesses in learning outcomes.** Every student will have both strengths and weaknesses in subjects being tested. With testing information, parents and teachers can work together to improve a student's knowledge and skills. Knowledge and skills are important to your child's ability to advance from grade to grade, and eventually to graduate from high school.

Receiving Test Results

Every parent whose child is taking the Ohio Proficiency Tests in March 2002 as a 4th or 6th grader is supposed to receive a report of their child's results. These results will become available at the end of the school year. If you do not receive this report on your child's results by the end of the school year, please contact

your school and ask for a copy. Study the sample results below to better understand the information on your child's testing results. **Please contact your child's teacher for help in understanding your child's performance.**

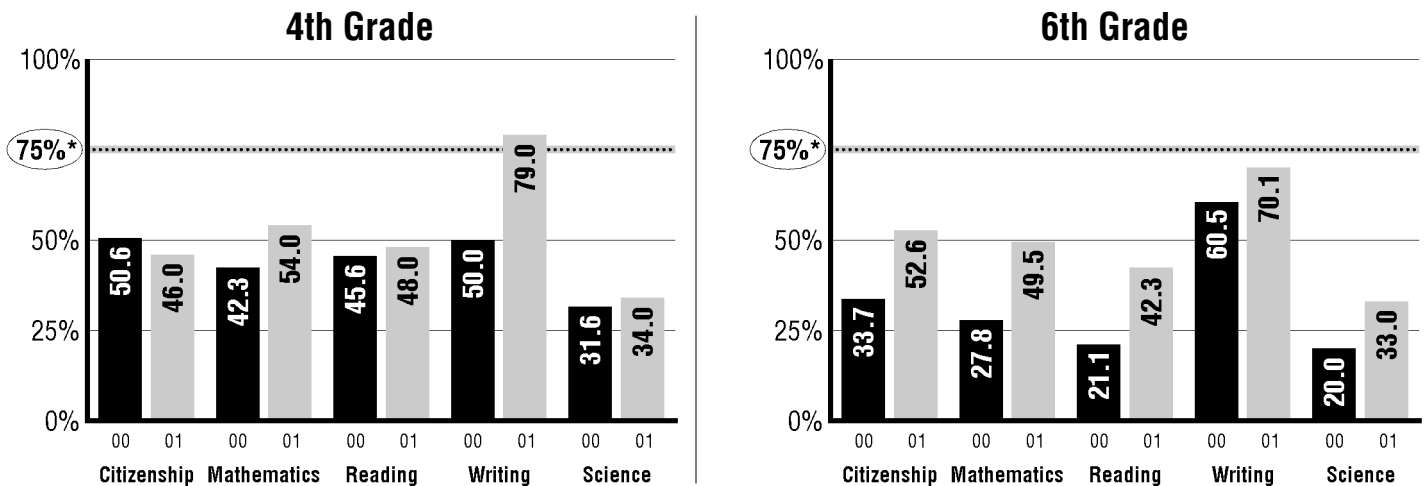

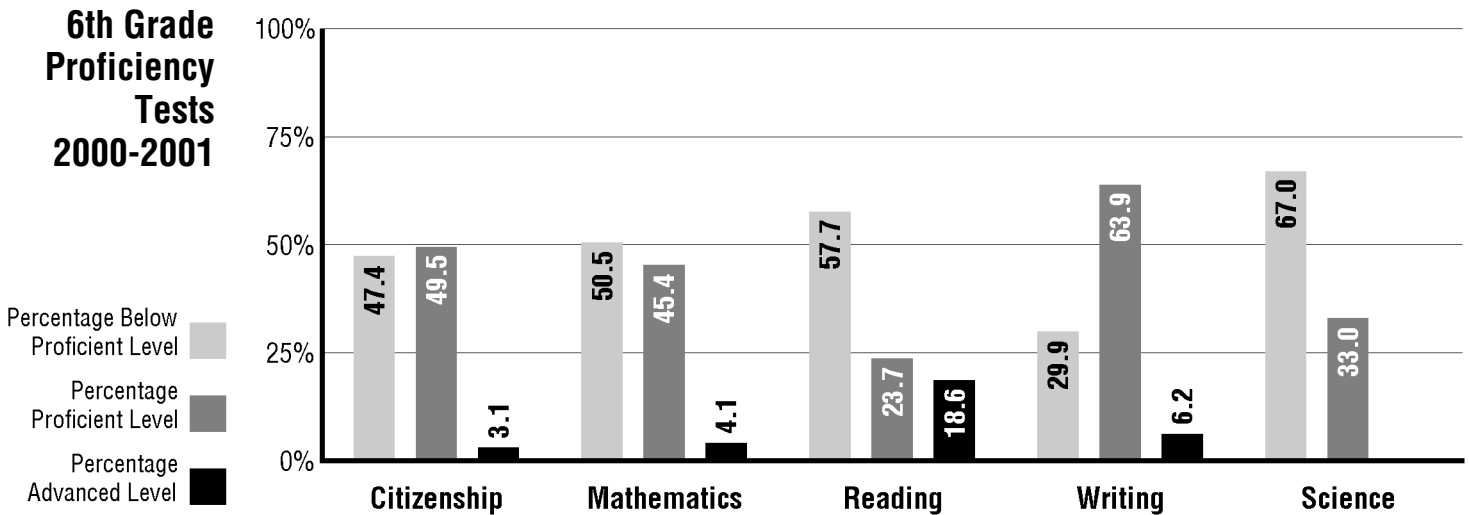
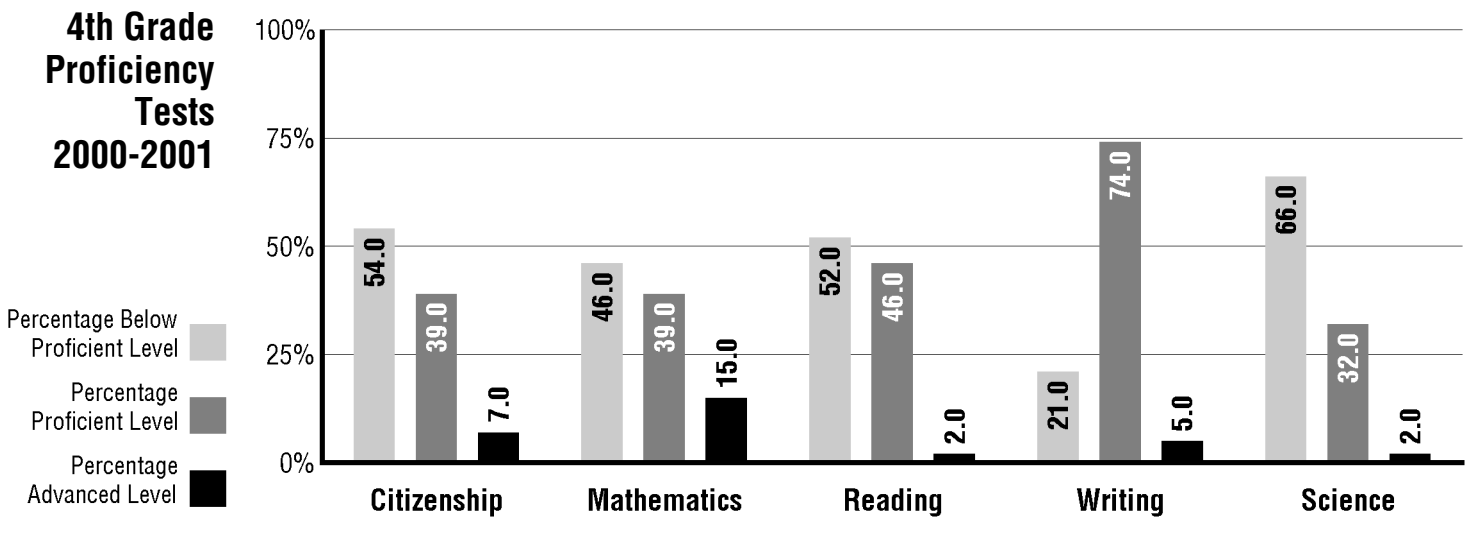
Understanding School Proficiency

Understanding Proficiency Levels

There are many ways to look at the test scores presented in this Report Card. The most important thing about the charts you've studied so far is to understand how your child is doing in comparison to students in the same grade throughout the state. The chart below is different in that it presents total student passing rates at your school for 2001. The proficiency levels show you whether

students have fallen short, reached or exceeded the minimum performance standards set for each student taking the test. *Percentage Advanced* is the highest performance level students can reach in Ohio in school year 2000-2001. If the Percentage Advanced (black) is larger than the Percentage Below Proficient (light grey), then your school is doing better for more of its students.

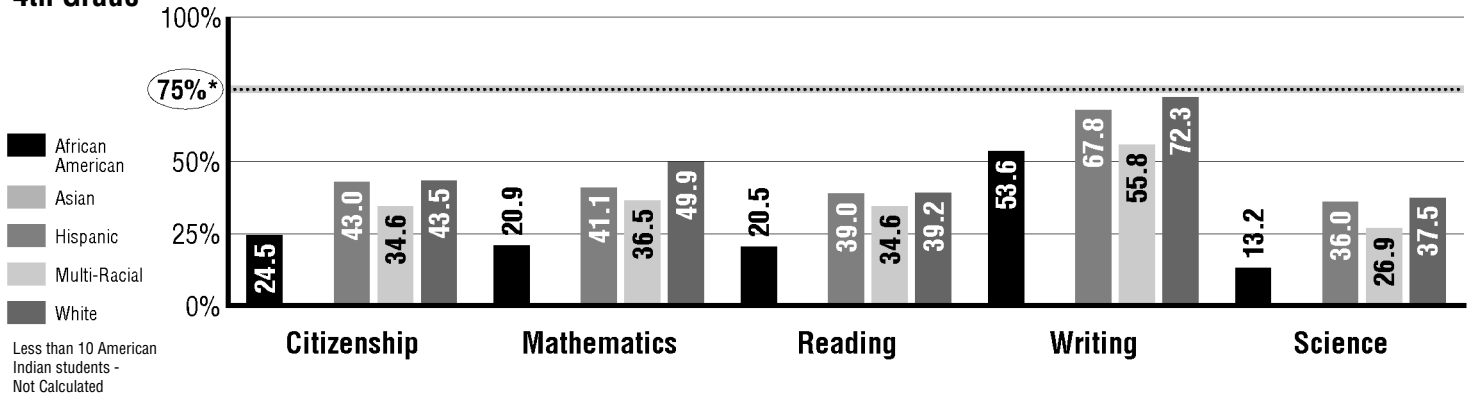

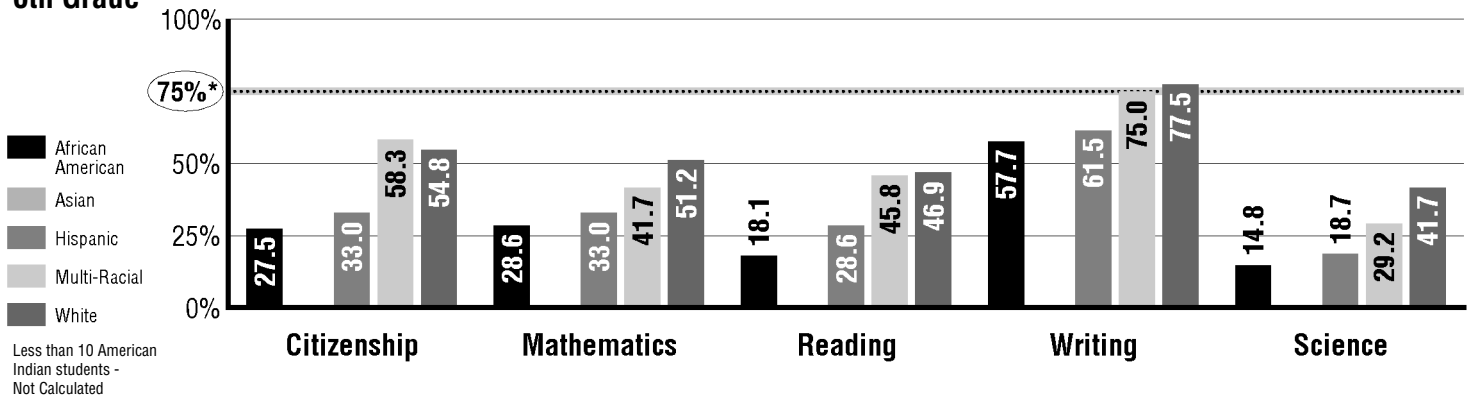
- EXCELLENT**- Districts met 26 or more performance indicators. (71 districts statewide received this rating)
